(EFV) held its sixth annual "Not in My Hood" march against senseless violence in conjunction with Council Member Jumaane D. Williams (D-Brooklyn) Deputy Leader and co-chair of the Council's Task Force to Combat Gun Violence, which led advocates and hundreds of community members toward a health and resource fair at Church Avenue, between Schenectady Avenue and East 46th Street. The event, which kicked off June's Gun Violence Awareness Month in New York City, promoted a message of keeping young people safe and providing them with a variety of positive opportunities to better their futures. Unfortunately, since the march, our community has suffered another loss due to gun violence. Our condolences go out to the family of Shemel Mercurius and other community members that have lost their loved ones due to senseless violence.

During the rally, Council Member Williams said recent NYPD reports show a spike in gun violence throughout Brooklyn, which is why it is more important than ever to spread the anti-violence message throughout the community. After reading the names of the local victims of gun violence in the past year, Monique Waterman Co-Founder and CEO of EFV led a two-mile procession from Meyer Levin Intermediate School 285 towards Church and Schenectady Avenues for the health and resource fair.

Throughout the march and rally, Derick Scott from Operation HOOD chanted "GUN VIOLENCE" while the crowd replied "NOT IN MY HOOD". The hope is that this message resonates through the community and is the anthem of community's response to the senseless violence that has plagued our neighborhoods.

The health and resource fair was designed as an educational and entertaining opportunity for all ages to have free access to basic preventative medicine and health screenings, as well as for young people to take advantage of educational, employment and after-school/summer activity resources. The event was supported by organizations that included McDonald's, Affinity Health, Brooklyn, Sesame Flyers, Board of Elections, Visions in Motion, Legal Aid Society and more.

"East Flatbush Village is proud to hold its sixth annual "Not in My Hood" antiviolence march," said Monique Waterman, CEO of East Flatbush Village, Inc. "We thank everyone who supported and came out. The hope is for events like this one would be the stamp for a proactive approach to the violence in the community. We want to reduce the violence in our communities by taking back our streets and provide programs, jobs, resources and opportunities."

"We greatly appreciate the ongoing support of Yeshaya Wasserman and SGW Properties, which makes such a difference in the lives of the children of our community," said Monique Waterman, Founder and Program Director of East Flatbush Village Inc.

"When I was elected to the City Council, I made it my mission to make the 45th District a safe place for all children to learn and grow," said Council Member Williams. "Community members have to be advocates against violence in their neighborhoods just as much as the activists and neighborhood leaders are. Keeping our streets safe is the responsibility of the police, but also the people who live in the community. As we advocate for nonviolence, we need to also address the societal and structural issues that contribute to the gun violence epidemic that is plaguing out black and brown communities. One of the main factors that contribute to violence is unemployment, which is why I am a strong proponent of universal summer youth employment. I am happy to continue my long-term collaboration with East Flatbush Village- a community institution that successfully works on the front lines engaging our youth."

NYS Senator Jessie Hamilton stated. "Taking concerted action against violence in our community strikes at a priority that too often impacts our family, friends, and neighbors in Central Brooklyn. Only through joining together, speaking out, and offering positive solutions can we overcome this problem. We do it when we act together in my United Against Violence Task Force. And we do it when with initiatives like this 'Not in My Hood' Anti-Violence March, Resource and Health Fair. Stepping up as a community, offering positive alternatives, role models, and resources will all ensure we successfully confront and overcome this deadly problem."
